Kia ora e te whānau

There is a lot in the media at the moment about schools and in particular, curriculum, attendance and teacher only days. I thought it might be useful to give you an update on the information we have.

Attendance is an increasing focus for the Ministry of Education. Our figures show that 59% of students attended school regularly during Term 3. 31% attended irregularly, 6% had moderate attendance and 4% had chronic attendance rates. Regular attendance is often lower during the winter months as you need to attend 90% of the term to hit this mark. It is worth noting the reasons for absences as well - 70% were for medical reasons, 20% for term time holidays, 6% for other justified reasons and 4% for explained, but unjustified reasons. I'm hoping in Term 4 we have a significant increase in the percentage of children attending school regularly. Irregular attendance patterns at primary school can have ongoing, detrimental impacts on education through into secondary school. Please do everything you can to make sure your child is attending school if they are well enough to do so. Holidays should be planned for the school breaks. When we notice patterns of non-attendance emerging, we make contact with you so that we can work together to support your child to attend school.

Curriculum changes are happening very quickly at the moment. Just this week, after a very short period of consultation, the refreshed maths and english curriculum documents have been released. It is expected we will implement these from the beginning of next year, however there is simply not enough time to learn about them between now and then. Unfortunately, they aren't all complete and we don't have all the information about assessment tools, etc at this point in time. We will work to implement these new curricula at a pace that is manageable for our staff and students. When ERO were here last term, they commented on the quality leadership and teaching in the school. Please be assured that your child will continue to be taught a quality programme as we learn about the new curriculum documents, then implement them in a manner that ensures they are well understood and any changes are embedded.

There was information in the media to say that **teacher only days** are no longer going to happen during the term. My understanding is this is from 2026. For 2025, the Ministry of Education had already confirmed that schools could take 2 teacher only days during the year to support teachers to learn about the new curriculum. These days are now called 'Curriculum Days'.

Structured Literacy is an approach to teaching literacy that is not completely new. We have been using aspects of this approach in our literacy programmes for some time. Having said that, we are working through professional development as it becomes available, to ensure that we are up to date with current practices. You may be aware that the government is no longer funding Reading Recovery programmes as of next year. Instead, they are providing support to schools to put in place a structured literacy early support programme which, like Reading Recovery, provides 1-1 and small group support for students who are still finding literacy challenging after a year of quality teaching. While we can't always access support for our students with limited resources, we have always been able to access the MOE Reading Recovery funding and had assumed we would also be able to access the replacement programme from 2025. Unfortunately, I was informed last week that our equity index is too low to receive any funding - this translates as your school is in a socio-economic area that doesn't warrant this support. I am currently challenging this decision. It is simply not acceptable for our children who need this resource to miss out on it. I am advocating for our children, their families and our community as a whole - even those children who don't require the support, benefit from others getting it as it means they are more equipped to cope in their classrooms and don't take up more than their share of teacher time in a classroom. I welcome any statements of support around this that I could share with the Ministry if needed - parent voice could be very influential if we don't see a change in position.

Thank you to those of you who completed our **learning conversation** survey last term. We have analysed the results of the parent and staff surveys. Based on the results, we will be making some changes for 2025, moving away from student-led conferences and doing learning conversations every year. The majority of parents seem to get more information from these and the majority of staff also prefer them. There will be some changes to the content and the way we share learning. More information will come next year.

School Donations/Annual Charges/Credits

Thank you to those parents/caregivers who have paid their annual charges/donations for the year.

All school donations are voluntary, but they are a crucial source of funding for our school. Some schools can opt into a scheme where the Ministry of Education funds an additional \$150 per student to the school. Unfortunately, Discovery School is not eligible to access this as it is assumed we can access additional revenue through parent donations. Discovery School's expenditure budget (in particular our curriculum budget) is prepared on the basis of providing the best possible education outcomes for your child. The reality is we cannot do this without your help. Your donation is spent on staffing to keep our class sizes smaller, curriculum resources such as art paper, physical education gear, mathematics books, library books, computer consumables, lessons with outside providers such as Big Air Gym, subscriptions and musical instruments, all of which are used in the day to day education of your child.

Parent donations are an essential part of ensuring that we resource our school adequately. Without donations many of our wonderful school activities would not be able to proceed. While we understand not all whānau are in a position to pay a donation to the school, we are very grateful to those of you who can assist us through providing a donation.

Musac Edge App - New Feature - Absences (preferred option)

You can now inform the office of absences via the app and it is super easy. We really encourage parents to use the app for absence notification if you can as it logs directly into the attendance register, which will assist with efficiency and accuracy at our end!

Access to the edge caregiver portal and app uses the existing email address that Discovery School has on record. This App allows you to view school information about your child(ren), notify the school of absences and view and pay school bills online (note there is a small surcharge for credit card payments). It gives you quick and easy access to the information for students in your household. Once you are in, click on 'notify school of absence' and follow the prompts. If your child is away sick, we do need the type of illness/reason noted. If you have any questions, please contact the office.
